General Secretary's Report for the AGM on 04/10/2005 in respect of the 2004 / 2005 year.

Membership

We have had a good intake of newcomers this season. Overall numbers are up from 124 last year to 139. Most importantly, many of the new joiners are active in the club, being out and about on the Sunday rides or Wednesday timetrials, and this augers well for the future.

I must mention the great sadness we experienced in the loss of Ed Unsworth. He was a decent fellow and a good contributor to the club and those around him. I am heartened that the Unsworth family have donated a trophy in his name, to be awarded to the winner of the Roadmans hillclimb from next year onwards. A fitting tribute.

Gill Moss, Reg Aubrey's daughter, has donated some documentation of his and a trophy – this will be awarded to the best placed club member in the club-run cyclo-cross events.

Sponsorship

Yello Ltd commenced sponsorship through discounted clothing, helmets and glasses this year and will continue into next year and, I am sure, beyond. The new-look clothing has been well received with the quality being far better than the previous offering.

I am also very please to say that C&G have confirmed their support for the Open events in 2006 to the tune of £600. Again, our thanks go to C&G for their continued support.

Events

A full range of events was promoted – club and open time trials, Sunday and Tuesday rides, two tours and two road races. This included the 5th national round of the Rudy Project Time Trial series – full report later on. As a rule the events were well supported – as will be observed from the reports from the relevant organisers.

I mentioned last year that we should consider organising a non-racing event such as a Reliability Ride. These types of event are increasing in popularity. Any takers?

Racing

Without stealing all the thunder from the Racing Secretary, it is worth making a point that a number of our newcomers are taking to time trials in a big way – both those new to the sport and those returning from early retirement. We have also had a number of Juniors giving it a bash, and we were proud to have a Junior team of three in the Rudy Project event. I hope this has lit the fuse for more participation next year.

Extraordinary General Meeting

We had a rare event this year, an EGM. This was to consider the proposed rule changes that stemmed from a review of the club handbook. A team of three (Ted, Alastair and Toby) undertook the task over the winter months and numerous changes were made. I believe the result is a handbook that will be easier to read / locate items from. A fairly small number of rule changes were made and these were all passed at the EGM.

Affiliations and Delegates

The club continues to be affiliated to all the cycling bodies, including BC. Our delegates to the CTT West District and the WTTA attended most meetings and are actively involved in the running of these bodies – both of which are there to support time trialing in the area. Ann Wooldridge is the Club Events secretary whilst Toby is the Risk Assessments Secretary. Toby was appointed as Secretary to the West DC at their AGM two weeks ago.

Non-Club activities

lan Humble continues to be the hub of the CCRL. Alastair Goldie is actively involved in Cycle Training, having been approved / vetted / tested for this position. A number of City members are also actively engaged with Bicycle Action Group for Gloucester where the major objective over the past 12 months was to produce a new and detailed cycle map of Gloucester. This finally came to fruition and the maps are now available.

Summary

Finances are healthy, activities are strong, membership is good. A pleasing result overall.

I have been the General Secretary for 10 years and will not be standing for this position. My new duties of Secretary for the West DC (including retaining the Risk Assessment duties) will demand a significant amount of time.

Gloucester City Cycling Club Annual Accounts for the year ending 31 August 2005

I have pleasure in presenting the accounts for the year ending 31 August 2005 and I am grateful to our Honorary auditor, Dave Ponter for examining them.

Copies of the balance sheet have been distributed and you will notice that I have given last year's figures for comparison; they are in italics and are on the left hand side of each column.

I will talk you through the figures:

Subscriptions include day and junior memberships and also Day Memberships purchased at Club Time trials. The figures are up on last year, partly because of late payers from the previous year. John Godley has the details of these if required. On Club Subscriptions, you will have seen that we have introduced a Standing Order facility and I would urge you to take this up to avoid chasing up late subscriptions

Donations paid out include Sustrans £500 Tsunami appeal £50, BAGG £25 and Headway £75 and Sustrans £75 again, the latter two in memory of Ed Unsworth.

CTT Handbooks are now only sold on a cash basis i.e. the money collected first by the Secretary, and monies no longer go through the Club accounts.

Most of the races made a modest profit except the CCRL where we incurred the cost of engraving the Trophy.

The C & G sponsorship money, £600, was paid directly into the deposit account and then paid out to the Race organisers when required thus earning interest. It is therefore not shown on the current account other than being incorporated into the income from the various races.

The figure of £119.40 for Club Time Trials is not complete as I have still to receive the balance of entry fees less the Racing Secretary's expenses of £40. The balance, as last year will appear in next year's accounts. There should be a surplus of about £70, sufficient for Dan Knight prizes and some left over for Club funds. The levis of 30pper rider £39.60 were paid to the CTT.

Clothing appears to be making a profit, (£2853) but some of this money is held as deposits and details of these can be had from the Secretary. We now have £675 worth of unsold clothing the proceeds of its sale going to Club Funds. This will make up part of our lost sponsorship from Town Cars plus the small mark up we make on garments sold. It is still really too early to say how the new system for recouping the sponsorship is working out, but it appears to be heading in the right direction.

Although the dinner tickets were subsidised by the Club, the loss was only £257.80 thanks mainly to the raffle and no disco to pay. Again Sponsorship money was utilised thereby spreading the sponsorship to all Members. This anticipated loss or ticket subsidy, had been authorised by the Committee prior to the Dinner.

Turning to Payments - The CTC affiliation and insurance has gone down from £75 to £50 because of a better deal struck between the CTC and their insurers. Members are however, reminded that the Club does not insure them for cycling incidents and that they should make their own provision. The CTC offer a very good rate and the Club receives commission. If

anyone wishes to take advantage of this, please get in touch with me. BC also have arrangements.

The £5000 shown as a payment is money paid into the Deposit account to gain interest. The money withdrawn from the Deposit account is the £2611 paid out for clothing.

From 1 September 2004 we moved our account to Alliance and Leicester which pays a very good rate of interest on the deposit accounts amounting to £140.86 in the year.

You will notice that the Club is poorer by £59 compared with last year but the finances continue to be robust. This enabled us to have trophies repaired and refurbished. We have also had to purchase more medals but their cost will be in next year's account.
